Jerusalem

The holiest city in the world, where history can be heard in the whispering of the wind along the walls, where every stone tells a wondrous story of a city that has drawn millions of faithful pilgrims for thousands of years. Here, alongside Jerusalem's fascinating historic and archeological sites, there are amazingly modern tourist attractions for all lovers of culture, the arts, theater and music, architecture and gastronomic delights.



Tel Aviv

Often called "the city that never stops," it was the first modern city built in Israel, and is the economic and cultural center. It is a lively, active city with entertainment, culture and art, festivals, and a rich night life done of clubs, restaurants and entertainment. Tel Aviv is Israel's center for culture and entertainment. The city has more than 20 museums, the most important are the Land of Israel and the Art Museum. It hosts the Philharmonic Orchestra, the Opera Company and the national dance and theater companies.



Nazareth

Located in the lower Galilee, the city is the heart of a valley surrounded by mountains that embrace several of the most important Christian sites in the world, where the angel Gabriel told Mary that she would conceive by the power of the Holy Spirit, and the place where Jesus spent his childhood and youth. A must is the visit to the Church of the Annunciation at the traditional site of Joseph and Mary's home. Today Nazareth is the largest Arab city in Israel and has about 30 churches and monasteries, as well as mosques and ancient synagogues.



Haifa

Israel's third largest city and one of its prettiest, Haifa is a multi-faceted city with several unique characteristics. It has the country's largest port, a particularly active beach and is the home of the World Center of the Bahai Faith which has its origins in Iran and its main symbol in the Bahai Gardens. Surrounded by abundant nature sites, the city contains an interesting mix of modern neighborhoods and older districts; churches and mosques; mountain and sea.



Mount Carmel

Its proximity to the sea gives the mountain large quantities of precipitation, which enable the growth of well developed Mediterranean groves. That is why it is often referred to as the "evergreen mountain". It is a particularly suitable location for family hikes and recreation pastimes all year round.



The Golan Heights

The Golan Heights, Israel's mountainous northern region, is one of the most beautiful and most traveled parts of the country. There are wonderful scenic treasures alongside lovely nature reserves, historic and archeological sites and attractions for the whole family. Some people call this area the Israeli Texas, because of its size, while others see it as a land of plentiful water sources.



Sea of Galilee

The Kineret is Israel's largest fresh water reservoir, and is also the country's largest and most important source and reservoir of drinking water. For this and other reasons, it has become an important national symbol and is also a first class tourism center. width of the beaches varies with the local geography, creating different landscapes in every location.



Eilat

Over the years, the city of Eilat has become the ultimate resort city with hotels and beaches packed with thousands of Israeli vacationers and tourists from around the world, who come to relax in the country's southern most spot. The combination of hot climate, tropical sea and breathtaking bare granite mountains has turned it into a tourist gem.

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
