Muscat

Muscat is the Capital and the pulsating heart of Oman. It is linked to Port Sultan Qaboos by Muttrah Corniche where visitors can view the wonderful variety of nature: golden beaches, mountainous heights and golden sand dunes. What is striking about it is the breathtaking intermingling of ancient cultural heritage and modern style. This allows Oman to preserve its historic character, and at the same time enjoying its contemporary spirit. The city has played a prominent historical role due to its strategic location.



Salalah&Dhofar

Dhofar Governorate is famous for its seasonal weather, locally known as monsoon or "Khareef", when it witnesses its best period, clothed in lush greenery and its hills surrounded by white fog. Light rains drizzle to cool the air. Salalah Tourism Festival takes place from 15 July to 31 August every year. The famous "Frankincense Trail" was named a UNESCO World Heritage Site and start in Salalah. It was used for the trade of the precious "the golden resin" already by Alexander the Great and the Queen of Sheba.



Khasab&Musandam

The Musandam Peninsula is located on the northern border of the Sultanate of Oman. The high mountains in this region rise for more than two thousand metres above sea level. The mountains spread out in a naturally geometrical way. This area also contains the most important waterway, The Strait of Hormuz. Khasab is famous for its magnificent villages and the thrilling roads that lead its mountain tops. Traditional ships trips, diving at the coral reefs and archaeological sites can be easily enjoyed.



Whales&Dolphins

Whales and Dolphins visit the shores of the Sultanate at irregular intervals, particularly in the North as in the Dhofar Governorate. One of the most famous bay is Hasik in the south, where the colony of whales never migrates. Note that the dolphins seen in Omani waters belong to the whale species.



Nizwa

Its Fort is one of the oldest forts in Oman with a unique large round shape and seven walls and multiple openings for stationing the fighters defending the fort. It was built by Imam Sultan Bin Saif Al Y'aribi who expelled the Portuguese from Oman. The fort is linked with a castle by means of intricate corridors. Near the fort and castle is the traditional Nizwa market famous for its artefacts.



Jabal Shams

This is the highest peak in the Arabian Peninsula. Close to the peak lies a deep chasm called the "An Nakhr Balcony", one of the most beautiful places in Oman. It is a deep ravine in the heart of the rocks that can be viewed from the top, which directly overlooks the ravine. At the bottom of the ravine rock formations chiselled into different forms by erosion lie at breathtaking depth.



The Turtle Reserve

The beaches extending from Ras Al Hadd to Masirah Island are considered a turtle reserve, including the green turtle, which is a rare turtle that returns every year to lay its eggs on the same beach where it was born decades ago. Ras Al Jins is a quiet sanctuary for turtles where they lay their eggs, securing the continued survival of the species and protecting them from extinction.



Wahiba Sands

Sculpted over many millennia by the northern shamal trade wind and the south-west monsoon, the Wahiba Sands are vast panorama of rolling sand dunes, deep gold and red by turns. A visit to a traditional Bedouin homestead is a highlight of any trip to the desert. Settle for a camel trekking, stopping in traditional camps adorned in Arabian nights style.

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
